MWA Scholarships For Urban Fiber with a Minnesota

Deadline for scholarship applications is February 1st!

If you would like to attend the 2015 Midwest Weavers Conference and need some financial help to do so, take the time to apply for a scholarship.

The MWA Board will support as many as twelve scholarships for the 2015 conference.

Three of the awards will include conference registration fees, room, and board.

A weaver with less than five years experience will receive the Jack A. Baker Scholarship, and two other allinclusive awards will be given to weavers who demonstrate financial need. The remaining scholarships will provide registration fees for the conference.

Carolyn Sue Balde and Margaret "Peg" Dawson were the winners from the drawing that was held during the last MWA business meeting. They will each receive a scholarship to cover the cost of their registration to the upcoming MWA conference in Minnesota.

In the conference booklet and on the conference and MWA websites, you will find details on applying for a scholarship and application deadlines.

Scholarships are awarded following a blind review of

applications by an independent committee. Previous scholarship awardees are not eligible.

Weaving Bright Gifts for Cancer Patients

Back in 2009, the Iowa Federation of Handweavers and Spinners challenged weavers who were mounting guild exhibits at the In the Heartland MWA Conference to incorporate a service project or community outreach into their exhibit planning.

The weavers from the Craft Guild of Iowa City took on two projects: weaving baby blankets for local hospitals and providing pillows for mastectomy patients at the University of Iowa Hospitals.

Five years later, the weavers are still delivering pillows to the cancer center a couple of times a year. To date, almost 400 have been distributed to grateful patients.

The heart-shaped pillows are used to cushion the mastectomy site and provide protection when wearing a seat belt. Each pillow has a cover of handwoven cotton that is backed with commercial fabric. Weave structure and col-

ors are chosen by the individual weaver, although bright colors are preferred.

The Guild encourages its weavers to add an extra half-yard or more to every cotton warp they wind in order to weave cloth for the pillow tops.

A guild loom has also been threaded with a long warp for members to weave off, and other members weave yardage for pillows as a way to Page 3 NEWS FROM THE MWA

play with structures and color.

When yardage sufficient for several dozen pillows has been collected, fusible interfacing is ironed onto the handwoven fabric, backing fabric is chosen from remnants donated from member's stashes, and the hearts are cut out.

After the pillow cases have been machine sewn together, the weavers gather for a stuff-and-stitch session to fill the pillows with batting and hand stitch the openings.

There is always lots of oohing-and-aahing about the whimsical and charming combinations of colors and fabrics. The Iowa City Guild members stay engaged with this project because so many of their lives have been touched by breast cancer—either their own or that of someone close to them.

The Guild also receives positive feedback from the cancer center and the patients who receive the pillows. A recent note from a recipient stated, "Thanks for this beautiful pillow. In an otherwise horrible day, it was a beacon of light, a thing that made me smile."
